Exploring the word Evolution

Our learners embarked on an enriching academic journey centered around the theme of evolution. Each day commenced with a structured Morning Circle designed to foster routine, belonging, and readiness to learn. Through meaningful discussions and thoughtfully planned activities, students developed an understanding of how living beings and environments transform over time. A key highlight was the "Evolution Dance," where concepts were expressed through coordinated movement. This was complemented by engaging music sessions that incorporated scarves, sticks, shakers, and rhythmic exploration using the Congo instrument to reinforce learning through auditory and kinesthetic modalities.



Creative Expression and Cultural Connections

Students participated in a range of hands-on activities intended to enhance creativity and deepen connections with early human life and culture. They explored ancient forms of communication through stone painting using symbolic patterns and designed tribal-inspired attire using natural materials such as leaves and clay. Additional activities included creating headgear with feathers, crafting musical instruments from paper cups, and designing mandalas with shapes and natural elements to develop pattern recognition and concentration. A notable experience was the mud house activity, wherein students created ancient-style face designs and engaged in clay modelling under the guidance of a potter, gaining insight into traditional craftsmanship and heritage.

Imaginative Exploration and Reflective Learning

Watching our children become cave painters, ancient storytellers, and rhythm makers was a highlight this week. Through our Time Travel theme, they stepped into pretend play scenarios — gathering around imaginary fires, trading goods, and narrating stories from long ago — which strengthened creativity, language, and social collaboration. Picture book sessions introduced them to new vocabulary and diverse perspectives, while group discussions encouraged active listening and thoughtful responses. Music activities like the Paper Cup Song brought rhythm, coordination, and joy, allowing our children to experience learning as play. Each day concluded with a Goodbye Circle, where our children shared their favorite moments, practiced gratitude, and reflected on what they learned. They went home with big smiles, proud of their creations, and eager to share their discoveries.
